Brief Centering Prayers

In the early centuries of the Christian Church, it was common practice to call to mind phrases of scripture to ground oneself in the midst of trials and struggles. Phrases to which we are drawn, from scripture or another source, can help us to be recollected and grounded in the midst of circumstances that might otherwise overwhelm us. Here are some suggested passages that may ground you in prayer:

O God make speed to save me; O Lord make haste to help me.

Glory to God whose power working in me can do infinitely more than I can ask or imagine.

I can do all things through Christ who strengthens me.

Lord have mercy; Christ have mercy; Lord have mercy.


My grace is sufficient.

Patient Trust

Above all, trust in the slow work of God.

We are quite naturally impatient in everything to reach the end without delay.

We should like to skip the intermediate stages.

And yet it is the law of all progress that it is made by passing through some stages of instability—and that it may take a very long time.

And so I think it is with you; your ideas mature gradually—let them grow, let them shape themselves, without undue haste. Don't try to force them on, as though you could be today what time (that is to say, grace and circumstances acting on your own good will) will make of you tomorrow.

Only God could say what this new spirit gradually forming within you will be. Give Our Lord the benefit of believing that his hand is leading you, and accept the anxiety of feeling yourself in suspense and incomplete.
