Building Project News

The PCC have agreed to begin the first phase of our building project, which involves new church lighting, electrical rewiring, and related works. This is set to begin in January 2021 and take 8-10 weeks. The proposed new lighting design from Light Perceptions Ltd can be viewed on the church website. We are now almost exactly half way to reaching our fundraising total of £600,000, after a generous grant from the Diocesan Development Fund. Please continue to pray for our fundraising efforts, and for the building project as we move forwards on this journey of faith.
