MAUNDY THURSDAY

Introduction

The service for Maundy Thursday can seem an awkward mixture of both celebration and sadness. Celebration because, traditionally, Christians see the events of this night as those which gave us the Eucharist itself; and sadness because there is the inevitable note of impending tragedy. There is betrayal, the painful lesson of humility and service (and, indeed, of learning to be served) and the anticipation of Christ's agony in Gethsemane. And yet such can be the nature of life with God – that in the midst of the deepest darkness it is possible to find light, or the seeds of what will become light for us as we persevere through that darkness.

The service takes the form of a celebration of the Eucharist. The gospel reading introduces the theme of serving and being served through the story of the washing of the disciples' feet. If you would like to take part in the foot-washing ritual, please sit near the central aisle and the president and deacon will come to you where you are.

At the end of the service, the stark reality of what is to come is anticipated by the stripping of the sanctuary of all the comforting symbols of our faith. Finally, we keep watch with Jesus as we seek to stay with our Lord through his sufferings and in so doing allow perseverance and compassion to be written more deeply into our own lives.

Gospel Reading

Hear the Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to John **Glory to you, O Lord.**

John 13:1-17,31b-35

Now before the festival of the Passover, Jesus knew that his hour had come to depart from this world and go to the Father. Having loved his own who were in the world, he loved them to the end. The devil had already put it into the heart of Judas son of Simon Iscariot to betray him. And during supper Jesus, knowing that the Father had given all things into his hands, and that he had come from God and was going to God, got up from the table, took off his outer robe, and tied a towel around himself. Then he poured water into a basin and began to wash the disciples' feet and to wipe them with the towel that was tied around him. Jesus came to Simon Peter, who said to him, 'Lord, are you going to wash my feet?' Jesus answered, 'You do not know now what I am doing, but later you will understand.' Peter said to him, 'You will never wash my feet.' Jesus answered, 'Unless I wash you, you have no share with me.' Simon Peter said to him, 'Lord, not my feet only but also my hands and my head!' Jesus said to him, 'One who has bathed does not need to wash, except for the feet, but is entirely clean. And you are clean, though not all of you.' For he knew who was to betray him; for this reason he said, 'Not all of you are clean.'

After he had washed their feet, had put on his robe, and had returned to the table, he said to them, 'Do you know what I have done to you? You call me Teacher and Lord—and you are right, for that is what I am. So if I, your Lord and Teacher, have washed your feet, you also ought to wash one another's feet. For I have set you an example, that you also should do as I have done to you. Very truly, I tell you, servants are not greater than their master, nor are messengers greater than the one who sent them. If you know these things, you are blessed if you do them.

When he had gone out, Jesus said, 'Now the Son of Man has been glorified, and God has been glorified in him. If God has been glorified in him, God will also glorify him in himself and will glorify him at once. Little children, I am with you only a little longer. You will look for me; and as I said to the Jews so now I say to you, "Where I am going, you cannot come." I give you a new commandment, that you love one another. Just as I have loved you, you also should love one another. By this everyone will know that you are my disciples, if you have love for one another.'

Sermon

The Washing of Feet

During the foot-washing, the choir sings a setting of Ubi Caritas:

Ubi caritas et amor, ubi caritas Deus ibi est. (Where charity and love are; there God is)

We pray for the rejected and unloved.

Lord, hear us and fill us with your love.

On this night, Jesus reminded his disciples that if the world hated them it hated him first. We pray for those who are persecuted for their faith.

Lord, hear us and give us your peace.

On this night, Jesus accepted the cup of death and looked forward to the new wine of the kingdom. We remember those who have died in the peace of Christ.

Lord, hear us and welcome all your children into paradise.

The Lord be with you and also with you.


Lift up your hearts.


We lift them to the Lord.

who, in the same night that he was betrayed, that is, this very night, took bread and gave you thanks; he broke it and gave it to his disciples, saying: Take, eat; this is my body which is given for you; do this in remembrance of me.

In the same way, after supper he took the cup and gave you thanks; he gave it to them, saying: Drink this, all of you; this is my blood of the new covenant, which is shed for you and for many for the forgiveness of sins. Do this, as often as you drink it, in remembrance of me.

Christ is the bread of life:

When we eat this bread and drink this cup, we proclaim your death, Lord Jesus, until you come in glory.

And so, Father, calling to mind his death on the cross, his perfect sacrifice made once for the sins of the whole world; rejoicing in his mighty resurrection and glorious ascension, and looking for his coming in glory, we celebrate this memorial of our redemption. As we offer you this our sacrifice of praise and thanksgiving, we bring before you this bread and this cup and we thank you for counting us worthy to stand in your presence and serve you.

Send the Holy Spirit on your people and gather into one in your kingdom all who share this one bread and one cup, so that we, in the company of [N and] all the saints, may praise and glorify you for ever, through Jesus Christ our Lord; by whom, and with whom, and in whom, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, all honour and glory be yours, almighty Father, for ever and ever


The Lord's Prayer

Prayer after Communion

Silence is kept.

The post-communion prayer is said

Lord Jesus Christ,
we thank you that in this wonderful sacrament
you have given us the memorial of your passion:
grant us so to reverence the sacred mysteries
of your body and blood
that we may know within ourselves
and show forth in our lives
the fruit of your redemption,
for you are alive and reign, now and for ever.

The Sacrament is transferred to the Altar of Repose

Please stand while the ministers process to the Lady Chapel and place the Sacrament on the Altar of Repose. You are welcome to move from your seats to be closer to the Lady Chapel. The clergy kneel before the altar and the 'Tantum Ergo' (hymn 457) is sung.

Therefore we, before him bending,

After a period of silence, the stripping of the altar and sanctuary is done in silence. Please be seated.

The story of Christ's agony in the garden is read.

Mark 14.32-42

They went to a place called Gethsemane; and he said to his disciples, 'Sit here while I pray.' He took with him Peter and James and John, and began to be distressed and agitated. And he said to them, 'I am deeply grieved, even to death; remain here, and keep awake.' And going a little farther, he threw himself on the ground and prayed that, if it were possible, the hour might pass from him.

He said, 'Abba, Father, for you all things are possible; remove this cup from me; yet, not what I want, but what you want.' He came and found them sleeping; and he said to Peter, 'Simon, are you asleep? Could you not keep awake one hour? Keep awake and pray that you may not come into the time of trial; the spirit indeed is willing, but the flesh is weak.' And again he went away and prayed, saying the same words. And once more he came and found them sleeping, for their eyes were very heavy; and they did not know what to say to him. He came a third time and said to them, 'Are you still sleeping and taking your rest? Enough! The hour has come; the Son of Man is betrayed into the hands of sinners. Get up, let us be going. See, my betrayer is at hand.'

During the Watch, you may wish to use any of the following meditations to help focus your prayer:

Meditation One

Jesus said to Peter, James, and John, 'I am deeply grieved, even to death; remain here, and keep awake.' Mark 14:34-36

In the Garden of Gethsemane, our God feels the weight of human misery. Alone, weeping, and overwhelmed with grief, the weakness of humanity meets the strength of God in Jesus.

And in that strength he prays that God's will be done.

As we watch with him in this garden, let us pray for God to fill us with that same courage, and strengthen us for whatever lies ahead.

My God (oh, let me call thee mine, Weak, wretched sinner though I be), My trembling soul would fain be thine; My feeble faith still clings to thee. Not only for the past I grieve, The future fills me with dismay; Unless thou hasten to relieve, Thy suppliant is a castaway.

Meditation Two

Jesus came and found the disciples sleeping; and he said to Peter, 'Simon, are you asleep? Could you not keep awake one hour? Keep awake and pray that you may not come into the time of trial; the spirit indeed is willing, but the flesh is weak.'

Mark 14:37-38

Sleep claims those whose eyelids are heavy, and the disciples squander those last precious hours. They would not sleep if their hearts could understand.

And we, who keep watch because we know what is coming, we are no more faithful, no more loving, no more wise.

As we wait with Christ tonight, let us pray that God would weave our failures into the story of his victory.

The grass never sleeps.

Or the roses.

Nor does the lily have a secret eye that shuts until morning. Jesus said, wait with me. But the disciples slept.

The cricket has such splendid fringe on his feet, and it sings, have you noticed, with its whole body, and heaven knows if it ever sleeps.

Jesus said, wait with me. And maybe the stars did, maybe the wind wound itself into a silver tree, and didn't move. Maybe the lake far away, where once he walked as on a blue pavement, lay still and waited, wild awake.

Oh the dear bodies, slumped and eye-shut, that could not keep that vigil, how they must have wept, so utterly human, knowing this too must be part of the story.

Meditation Three

While Peter was below in the courtyard, one of the servant-girls of the high priest came by. When she saw Peter warming himself, she stared at him and said, 'You also were with Jesus, the man from Nazareth.' But he denied it, saying, 'I do not know or understand what you are talking about.'

Mark 14:66-68

The disciples flee and Peter denies he ever met Jesus. His fear is so great he doesn't even remember that Jesus predicted this.

We deny him too when we fail to live as he has asked us, when we refuse to let our faith be known, when we deny what is right for fear of losing what is comfortable.

As we pray in silence, let us ask forgiveness for our failure to speak out for Jesus.

Ah, holy Jesu, how hast thou offended, that we to judge thee have in hate pretended! By foes derided, by thine own rejected, O most afflicted.

Who was the guilty? Who brought this upon thee? Alas, my treason, Jesu, hath undone thee. 'Twas I, Lord Jesu, I it was denied thee: I crucified thee. For me, kind Jesu, was thy incarnation, thy mortal sorrow, and thy life's oblation; thy death of anguish and thy bitter passion, for my salvation.

Therefore, kind Jesu, since I cannot pay thee, I do adore thee, and will ever pray thee, think on thy pity and thy love unswerving, not my deserving.

Meditation Four

At that moment the cock crowed for the second time. Then Peter remembered that Jesus had said to him, 'Before the cock crows twice, you will deny me three times.' And he broke down and wept.

Mark 14:72

At dawn, Peter wept for his unfaithfulness; in the darkness, we remember ours. We watch with the same Jesus who will hang upon the cross, who suffers for our sin.

But Easter is coming, and the dawning day will bring with it the love that conquers death. And in that love we too are forgiven and restored.

As we rest in the presence of God, pray for that love to surround us.

Here is the source of every sacrament,
